THE PSALM OF INTRODUCTION—PSALM 103

Reader: Bless the Lord, O my soul; O Lord my God, Thou hast been magnified exceedingly. Confession and majesty hast Thou put on, Who coverest Thyself with light as with a garment, Who stretchest out the heaven as it were a curtain; Who supported His chambers in the waters, Who appointed the clouds for His ascent, Who walketh upon the wings of the winds, Who maketh His angels spirits, and His ministers a flame of fire.

Who establisheth the earth in the sureness thereof; it shall not be turned back forever and ever. The abyss like a garment is His mantle; upon the mountains shall the waters stand. At Thy rebuke they will flee, at the voice of Thy thunder shall they be afraid.

The mountains rise up and the plains sink down, unto the place where Thou hast established them. Thou appointedst a bound that they shall not pass, neither return to cover the earth. He sendeth forth springs in the valleys; between the mountains will the waters run. They shall give drink to all the beasts of the field; the wild asses will wait to quench their thirst. Beside them will the birds of the heaven lodge, from the midst of the rocks will they give voice.

He watereth the mountains from His chambers; the earth shall be satisfied with the fruit of Thy works. He causeth the grass to grow for the cattle, and green herb for the service of men, to bring forth bread out of the earth; and wine maketh glad the heart of man. To make his face cheerful with oil; and bread strengtheneth man's heart.

The trees of the plain shall be satisfied, the cedars of Lebanon, which Thou hast planted. There will the sparrows make their nests; the house of the heron is chief among them. The high mountains are a refuge for the harts, and so is the rock for the hares.

He hath made the moon for seasons; the sun knoweth his going down. Thou appointedst the darkness, and there was the night, wherein all the beasts of the forest will go abroad; young lions roaring after their prey, and seeking their food from God. The sun ariseth, and they are gathered together, and they lay them down in their dens. Man shall go forth unto his work, and to his labor until the evening. How magnified are Thy works, O Lord! In wisdom hast Thou made them all.

The earth is filled with Thy creation. So is this great and spacious sea, wherein are things creeping innumerable, small living creatures with the great. There go the ships; there this leviathan, whom Thou hast made to play therein. All things wait on Thee, to give them their food in due season; when Thou givest it them, they will gather it. When Thou openest Thy hand, all things shall be filled with goodness; when Thou turnest away Thy face, they shall be troubled. Thou wilt take their spirit, and they shall cease; and unto their dust shall they return. Thou wilt send forth Thy Spirit, and they shall be created; and Thou shalt renew the face of the earth.

"O LORD I HAVE CRIED" IN TONE EIGHT

Choir: O Lord, I have cried out unto Thee, hear Thou me; hear Thou me, O Lord. O Lord,

I have cried out unto Thee, hear Thou me. Give ear to the voice of my supplication

when I cry out unto Thee: hear Thou me, O Lord.

Choir: Let my prayer be set forth before Thee as the incense, and the lifting up of my hands

as the evening sacrifice; hear Thou me, O Lord.

- + Set a watch, O Lord, before my mouth, and a protecting door round about my lips.
- + Incline not my heart to evil words, to make excuses in sins.
- + With men that work iniquity; and I will not communicate with the choicest of them.
- + The just man shall correct me in mercy and shall reprove me; but let not the oil of the sinner anoint my head.
- + For my prayer also shall still be against the things with which they are well pleased; their judges falling upon the rock have been swallowed up.
- + They shall hear my words, for they are sweet; as when the thickness of the earth is broken upon the ground, their bones are scattered by the side of hell.
- + But to Thee, O Lord, Lord, are mine eyes; in Thee have I put my trust, take not away my soul.
- + Keep me from the snare which they have laid for me, and the traps of the workers of iniquity.

The Penitential Stichera from the Triodion in Tone Eight

Verse 10. Bring my soul out of prison, that I may praise Thy Name.

The angels praise Thee without ceasing, O King and Master, and I fall before Thee crying like the Publican: God be merciful to me and save me.

Verse 9. The righteous shall wait for me until Thou recompense me.

Since thou art immortal, O my soul, be not overwhelmed by the waves of life; but return to soberness and cry to Thy Benefactor: God be merciful to me and save me.

Verse 8. Out of the depths have I cried to Thee, O Lord, Lord hear my voice.

Give me tears, O God, as once Thou gavest them to the woman that had sinned, and count me worthy to wash Thy feet that have delivered me from the way of error. As sweet-smelling ointment let me offer Thee a pure life, created in me by repentance; and may I also hear those words for which I long: "Thy faith hath saved thee, go in peace."

Verse 7. Let Thine ears be attentive to the voice of my supplication.

When I call to mind the many evils I have done, and I think upon the fearful day of judgment, seized with trembling I flee to Thee for refuge, O God Who lovest mankind. Turn not away from me, I beseech Thee, Who alone art free from sin; but before the end comes grant compunction to my humbled soul and save me.

For Sunday of Orthodoxy in Tone Four

Verse 6. If Thou, O Lord, shouldest mark iniquities, O Lord, who shall stand? For with Thee there is forgiveness.

Grant me reverence, estrangement from evil, and perfect discipline, who am now drowned in the passions of the flesh, estranged from Thee, and entirely without hope, O my God, King of all. Save me, thy prodigal son, by the bounty of thy goodness, O Jesus the Almighty, the Savior of our souls.

Verse 5. Because of Thy Name have I waited for Thee, O Lord; my soul hath waited upon Thy word, my soul hath hoped in the Lord.

When Moses the wonderful was purified by fasting, he beheld the beloved One. Wherefore, emulate him, my humble soul, and hasten to be purified of evils on the day of abstinence, that the Lord may bestow forgiveness on thee, and that thou mayest behold Him, for He is the Almighty, the good Lord, and the Lover of mankind.

Also for Sunday of Orthodoxy in Tone Six

Verse 4. From the morning watch until night, from the morning watch let Israel trust in the Lord. Let us now set out with joy upon the second week of the Fast; and like Elijah the Tishbite let us fashion for ourselves from day to day, O brethren, a fiery chariot from the four great virtues; let us exalt our minds through freedom from the passions; let us arm our flesh with purity and our hands with acts of compassion; let us make our feet beautiful with the preaching of the Gospel; and let us put the enemy to flight and gain the victory.

For St. Basil of Ancyra in Tone Four (**Thou who wast called from on high**)

Verse 3. For with the Lord there is mercy and with Him is abundant redemption, and He will deliver Israel from all his iniquities.

O lauded Basil, adorned in priestly vestments, * like an Angel serving God, thou madest sacrifice * to Him made manifest in the flesh * for our salvation; * and having served in thy sacred ministry, * thou thyself wast sacrificed like an unblemished lamb * and thou wast made a pure sacrifice * and hast been offered * now on the altar of God which is on high. * Hence, with our voices we all call thee blest, * as in gladness and joy we cry unto thee: * Never cease to entreat Christ * that our souls be saved, O Saint of God.

Verse 2. *Praise the Lord, all ye nations; praise Him, all ye people.*

When flayed alive by a most unrighteous judgment, * thou didst bravely bear the pains by looking patiently * to that eternal inheritance * which is without pain * and to the prizes laid up for them that strive. * Tempered in the fire, thou didst become an iron sword * forged in the Heavens and hewing down * the foe's battalions. * Wherefore, O glorious Basil blest of God, * the tongue of every pious man this day * doth revere thee with joy, while beseeching thee * that thou offer entreaty * for thy flock unto the God of all.

Verse 1. For His mercy is great toward us, and the truth of the Lord endureth forever.

Being made fair with divine wounds, thou wast taken * from one city to another as a prisoner, * binding the tyrant with mighty bonds, * but rightly guiding * the Godward paths of thy feet in piety; * and when thou wast come to Caesarea at the last, * thou didst receive there thy blessed end, * O sacred Martyr, * and to the heavenly city didst ascend, * O all-wise Basil, wearing crowns of light. * Now thou standest before God, the King of all. * Do thou therefore entreat Him * to enlighten and to save our souls.

THEOTOKION FROM THE MENAION IN TONE FOUR

(**Thou who wast called from on high**)

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit; both now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Since through mine own sloth and carelessness, O Virgin, * I am fallen mis'rably to depths of many sins, * and I, the wretch, am in misery * and am afflicted * with sore despair and dismayed perplexity: * Be to me a source of mercy and a ready help * and my salvation, O spotless one; * and I beseech thee * and ask with longing that thou bestow on me * thy gracious consolation from on high; * and I fall down before thee and cry with faith: * May I not be forsaken * to the enemy's malignant joy.

THE HOLY ENTRANCE

(While the Theotokion is chanted, the following dialogue occurs QUIETLY as the clergy make the entrance.) Deacon: Let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

Priest: In the evening and in the morning and at noonday we praise Thee, we bless Thee, we give thanks unto Thee, and we pray unto Thee, O Master of all, Lord Who lovest mankind: Direct our prayer as incense before Thee, and incline not our hearts unto words or thoughts of evil, but deliver us from all who seek after our souls. For unto Thee, O Lord, Lord, are our eyes, and in Thee have we hoped. Put us not to shame, O our God. For unto Thee are due all glory, honor, and worship: to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit; now and ever, and unto ages of ages.

Deacon: Amen.

(When the clergy reach the center of the solea, the first part of the great censing begins. After the first part of the great censing is completed, this next dialogue occurs QUIETLY.)

Deacon: Bless, father, the Holy Entrance.

Priest: Blessed is the entrance to Thy Holy Place, always, now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

(After the choir has finished, the following is said ALOUD.)

Deacon: Wisdom! Let us attend!

O GLADSOME LIGHT (CHANT) (CHORAL)

Choir: O gladsome Light of the holy glory of the Father Immortal, heavenly, holy, blessed Jesus Christ. In that we now are come unto the setting of the sun and behold the light of evening, we

hymn Thee: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, God. For meet it is that at all times Thou shouldst be magnified by voices holy. O Son of God, Who bestowest life; for which cause all the world doth glorify Thee.

Deacon: The Evening Prokeimenon!

SECOND LENTEN GREAT PROKEIMENON IN TONE EIGHT

Choir: Thou hast given an inheritance, O Lord, to them that fear Thy Name. (TWICE)

Verse 1. From the ends of the earth I cried unto Thee. (Refrain)

Verse 2. I shall be protected under the cover of Thy wings. (Refrain)

Verse 3. I will praise Thy Name forever. (Refrain)

Choir: Lord, have mercy. (THRICE)

Priest: For Thou art a merciful God and lovest mankind, and unto Thee we ascribe glory:

to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit; now and ever, and unto ages

of ages.

Choir: Amen.

APOLYTIKION OF THE FIRST SUNDAY OF GREAT LENT IN TONE TWO (CHANT) (CHORAL)

Thy pure image do we venerate, O good One, asking forgiveness of our sins, O Christ our God; for by Thine own will Thou didst ascend the Cross in Thy body, to save Thy creatures from the bondage of the enemy. Wherefore, with thankfulness we cry aloud to thee: Thou hast verily filled all with joy, since Thou didst come, O our Savior, to save the world.

THE LITANY (AT THE FOURTH STOP)

Deacon: Have mercy on us, O God, according to Thy great mercy, we pray Thee, hearken

and have mercy.

Choir: Lord, have mercy. (THRICE)

Deacon: Again we pray for the ever-memorable Orthodox patriarchs, kings and rulers, and

all our fathers and brethren, the Orthodox departed this life before us, who here and

in all the world lie asleep in the Lord.

Choir: Memory eternal. (THRICE)

Priest: For Thou art the Resurrection, and the Life, and the Repose of Thy departed

servants, O Christ our God, and unto Thee we ascribe glory, together with Thy Father, Who is from everlasting, and Thine All-Holy, and good, and life-giving

Spirit: now and ever, and unto ages of ages.

Choir: Amen.

APOLYTIKION OF THE FIRST SUNDAY OF GREAT LENT IN TONE TWO (CHANT) (CHORAL)

THE SYNODICON: THE AFFIRMATION OF THE ORTHODOX FAITH

As the Prophets beheld, as the Apostles have taught, as the Church has received, as the Teachers have dogmatized, as the universe has agreed, as Grace has shown forth, as Truth has revealed, as falsehood has been dissolved, as Wisdom has presented, as Christ has awarded: thus we declare, thus we assert, thus we preach Christ our true God, and honor His Saints in words, in writings, in thoughts, in sacrifices, in churches, in Holy Icons; on the one hand worshiping and reverencing Christ as God and Lord; and on the other hand honoring as true servants of the same Lord of all, and accordingly offering them veneration.

This is the Faith of the Apostles; this is the Faith of the Fathers; this is the Faith of the Orthodox; this is the Faith which has established the universe!

THE NICENE-CONSTANTINOPOLITAN CREED

People: I believe in one God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible. And in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the Son of God, the Only-begotten, Begotten of the Father before all worlds, Light of Light, Very God of Very God, Begotten, not made; of one essence with the Father, by Whom all things were made: Who for us men and for our salvation came down from heaven, and was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary, and became man. And was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate, and suffered and was buried. And on the third day He rose again, according to the Scriptures. And ascended into heaven, and sitteth at the right hand of the Father. And He shall come again with glory to judge the living and the dead, Whose Kingdom shall have no end. And I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, and Giver of Life, Who proceedeth from the Father, Who with the Father and the Son together is worshipped and glorified, Who spake by the Prophets. And I believe in One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church. I acknowledge one Baptism for the remission of sins. I look for the Resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

- Choir: Who is so great a God as our God? Thou alone art the God that doest wonders. (ONCE)
- **Verse 1.** Thou hast made known Thy power among the peoples. (*Refrain*)
- **Verse 2.** And I said, now have I begun; these are the charges of the right hand of the Most High. (*Refrain*)
- **Verse 3.** Remembering the works of the Lord; for from the beginning I will remember Thy wonders. (*Refrain*)

THE HYMN OF ST. SIMEON THE GOD-RECEIVER (Plain Reading)

Rejoice, O Virgin Theotokos, Mary full of grace; the Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, for thou didst give birth to the Savior of our souls. (*The clergy and people prostrate.*)

O Baptizer of Christ, remember our congregation, that we may escape from our iniquities, for to thee was given grace to intercede for us. (*The clergy and people prostrate.*)

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

O pure apostles, and all ye saints, pray for our sakes, that we escape tribulations and sorrows, for we have taken ye as fervid intercessors with the Savior. (*The clergy and people prostrate.*)

Both now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

We have taken refuge under the wing of thy compassion, O Theotokos. Turn not away from our beseechings in tribulation, but save us from distress, O thou who alone art pure and blessed. (No prostration.)

Reader: Lord, have mercy. (40 times)

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit; both now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

More honorable than the Cherubim, and more glorious beyond compare than the Seraphim, thou who without corruption bearest God the Word and art truly Theotokos: we magnify thee.

Bless, father, in the Name of the Lord.

Priest: Christ our God, the Existing One, is blessed, always, now and ever, and unto ages

of ages.

Reader: Amen. O heavenly King, support our believing kings; confirm their faith; guide the

nations; give peace to the world and preserve well this holy church. Grant repose to our departed fathers and brothers, in the dwelling-places of the righteous. Receive us in repentance and confession, for Thou art good and the Lover of

mankind.

THE PRAYER OF ST. EPHRAIM THE SYRIAN

Priest: O Lord and Master of my life, take from me the spirit of sloth, meddling, lust of

power, and idle talk. (The clergy and people prostrate.)

But give rather the spirit of chastity, humility, patience and love to Thy servant.

(*The clergy and people prostrate.*)

Yea, O Lord and King, grant me to see my own sins and not to judge my brother; for Thou art blessed unto ages of ages. Amen. (*The clergy and people prostrate*.)

THE DISMISSAL

Priest: Glory to Thee, O Christ our God and our hope, glory to Thee.

Choir: Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit; both now and ever, and

unto ages of ages. Amen. Lord, have mercy (thrice). Father, bless.

Priest: May Christ our true God, through the intercessions of His all-immaculate and all-blameless holy Mother; by the protection of the honorable Bodiless Powers of Heaven; at the supplication of Saint N., the patron and protector of this holy community; of the holy and righteous ancestors of God, Joachim and Anna; of the Hieromartyr Basil of Ancyra; Martyr Kallinika of Rome; and Venerable-martyr Euthymios of Prodromou Skete on Athos, whose memory we celebrate today, and of all the saints: have mercy on us and save us, forasmuch as He is good and loveth mankind.
