Pastoral Message for the Great Fast 2016

"Thy grace hath risen, O Lord and the illumination of our souls hath shown forth. Lo, now is the acceptable time; the season of repentance hath come. Let us cast down the works of darkness, and put on the works of light, that we may pass the great tempest of fasting and reach the summit of the third day Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, the Savior of our souls."

(from the Aposticha of the Vesper Service for the Evening of Cheese Fare)

We greet you with anticipation as we embark on the Holy Season of the Great Fast in preparation for the Glorious Resurrection of our Lord and God and Savior Jesus Christ.

The beautiful verse above embodies the true spirit of the Lenten Season as we begin our journey to draw nearer to God so that we may worthily rejoice in His Resurrection. We are called to "cast down the works of darkness, and put on the works of light". We are all aware that the world in which we live presents us many opportunities to participate in darkness, that is, all pursuits which draw us away from God and are displeasing to Him. These are the works of Satan and his followers who despise the light, for the light shines brightly and reveals them as pure evil. But our Lord Jesus Christ is the True Light, and He has declared that we are "the light of the world." (Matthew 5:14).

Diakonissa Toy Ma'ae - Membership Coordinator





Happenings Around The Diocese of Los Angeles & the West, Eagle River & the Northwest

Across our Archdiocese the Sisterhood of Antiochian Women (AW) are busy in their communities supporting various charities, gathering in prayer & fellowship and supporting their local parishes & communities in an endless variety of ways. The Antiochian Women of the Diocese of Los Angeles & the West are certainly no different! Our Diocese is actually double size, extending all the way to the Great State of Alaska & including the provinces of Western Canadian, so the following is but a glimpse into all that is happening around our Diocese!

Tis the season...for Annunciation Teas! Across our Dioceses, several of our parishes hold an Annunciation Tea on the Saturday surrounding the feast of our Patron, the Theotokos. Although each parish has their own spin on this event, for all it includes prayer, fellowship & of course "tea & teacups!"

In Saskatoon, the AW of St. Vincent of Lerins, started a lending library as a means of sharing books on our Orthodox faith. What began as a small endeavor that fit on a large bookshelf has grown into a full room that includes icons, cards, incense and gift items. One of the greatest blessings has been in making books on our faith available to the women of the more rural areas who otherwise would not have accessibility.

Throughout our Diocese our Antiochian Women are very busy with humanitarian service acts of mercy remembering as we learn in Matthew 25:40 "Inasmuch as ye have done *it* unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done *it* unto me." At St. Athanasius in Santa Barbara they are very active in providing outreach to the homeless community with weekly dinners and distribution of hygiene kits, blankets, mittens & backpacks. Our sisters up north at St. John Cathedral in Eagle River, AK participate in many projects including collecting warm coats, hats, scarves & gloves for incarcerated women who are scheduled to be released. At St. James in Modesto, CA they too provide hats, gloves & scarves to the homeless, as well as serve dinner at the local Salvation Army. Additionally, the ladies of St. Ignatius in Mesa, AZ support families of single mothers & their children who escape domestic violence with food gift certificates, as well as serving meals to the hungry through a local community program.

In Calgary, our Church of The Annunciation has seen a significant increase in the arrival of Syrian refugee families. Many of these families arrive with only the clothes on their backs. The AW have been raising funds, and gathering furniture, household items, food, canned goods, blankets, clothes, and kitchenware to help establish these families and get them settled into a new life & homes.

Our AW also remember our own extended Orthodox community in many ways. At St. Luke in Garden Grove, CA they have raised funds to support three monastic communities and also financial gifts to our five Diocese seminarians. The AW of St. John in Orinda visited Mother Melania & the Sisters at Holy Assumption Monastery in Calistoga, CA taking with them donations and supplies. At the Church of the Redeemer in Los Altos, CA they were blessed to receive a visit from His Grace, Bishop JOSEPH of Damascus. During His Grace's visit the AW held a falafel luncheon with proceeds going to support sick children in his Diocese. Several of our parishes are heeding the call to prepare IOCC kits. As part of this effort, the ladies of St. Barnabas in Costa Mesa hand sewed 40 baby blankets. At St. Michael, Van Nuys, CA a son of the parish is currently deployed in Afghanistan, resulting in the AW adopting his US Army squad of 8 with care packages.

Of course, fellowship is an important aspect of being Antiochian Women and fellowship occurs in many forms. St. Luke's AW enjoyed a movie night during the Christmas season. At St. Anthony in San Diego the ladies hold a cookie & ornament exchange. St. Mark in Irvine, CA, St. Luke, Garden Grove, St. Michael, Van Nuys all hold Christmas fellowship dinners. With many expectant moms, church baby showers are a way for the AW at Sts. Peter & Paul in Salt Lake City, UT to enjoy each other's company.

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Often fellowship & spiritual overlap, as when the AW of St. Nicholas in San Francisco were blessed to go together to visit the Holy relics of St. John Maximovitch in San Francisco. In Phoenix, AZ, the AW of St. George gathered together to learn more about iconography from two gifted iconographers within their own community.

The AW of St. Nicholas Cathedral held their biannual Sweetheart Ball in February. It's the culmination of multiple events that brings together young debutants and their escorts from multiple parishes, primarily in Southern California and this year even one from St. Nicholas in San Francisco.

As we journey to the Paschal Season, the Antiochian Women stay busy with Lenten dinners, decorating Paschal candles, and planning for fast free Spring festivals & events. Always remembering that we are blessed to be, "A Sisterhood Serving Christ, Through Serving Others."

JAM SQUARES

1 cup brown sugar

1 1/2 cup flour

1/2 cup oatmeal

3/4 cup margarine, melted

1-2 cups jam – apricot or your favorite

1 tsp soda

Mix all ingredients except jam.

Spread about 2/3 into a buttered 8x8 pan.

Spread jam. Sprinkle remaining 1/3 mixture on top.

Preheat oven to 350F. Bake 25 minutes or until golden brown. Let cool. Cut into squares and enjoy.

There's an old philosophical question – if a tree falls in a forest and there's no one around to hear, does it make a sound?

Similarly, if an Antiochian Woman finds herself 2500 miles away from her nearest sisters, does she cease being an Antiochian Woman?

I suppose if I reveal the circumstances of why I've found myself so far away from my beloved sisters, any remote inkling of sympathy you might have had a moment ago will evaporate...and that's okay.


My family and I usually reside in Kern County, California, and are parishioners at Holy Cross Antiochian Orthodox Church in Palmdale. This past year, however, brought a monumental change for our family. My husband, an officer in the Air Force Reserve, was activated for a year. Ordinarily, this means that he goes on a

trip for a few weeks at a time, and I remain home with our four children.

This past year, however, due to staffing shortages, his chain of command asked if he might be able to perform a year of duty. Given that his primary duty station is in Hawaii, we jumped at the opportunity and have been enjoying the Spirit of Aloha for the past year.

With no Antiochian presence here, our adopted parish of Ss. Constantine and Helen Greek Orthodox Cathedral of the Pacific has been a welcoming parish family during our year of transition. I thank God for the love that Fr. Alex and Presvytera Nicole Leong have shown us. I'm especially grateful for the blessing of an Orthodox military chaplain here on Oahu as well, Fr. John Kalantzis and his wife Presvytera Michelle.

We've jumped into parish life amid our Greek and Hawaiian friends. From learning to make spanakopita to being spiritually fed weekly at their group for Orthodox moms of young children, it's been a delight.



Knowing that was especially sweet when our choir was asked to give a second performance during the competition weekend for a very special audience made up of Archbishop Demetrios, Metropolitan Gerasimos, Bishop Apostolos, and other clergy and Greek media representatives. What an incredible way to experience a taste of the fullness of the Church!

I'll admit – even though Hawaii is rightly seen as paradise, it took me some time to get connected in both the parish and in my new role as an active duty military spouse. Shortly after our arrival in Hawaii, I was blessed to discover an example to follow in the life of St. Xenia of St. Petersburg – also the wife of a military officer. May God be praised in His saints!

In her later years, after her husband's death, St. Xenia would often go to the house of a friend and in the middle of a conversation would jump up and say, "I must go! I am needed there!" and go off to wherever it was she sensed someone was in need.

My awareness of others' needs comes in much more ordinary ways. That said, recognizing and responding to the temporal needs of others has been a powerful way to bring the ethos of being an Orthodox Christian and an Antiochian Woman into this environment – even when I'm the only Antiochian Woman for miles around. If I open my eyes and am willing to see the needs of others, I discover...I am needed there!

The demands on our armed forces – both active duty and reserve – have been nearly nonstop for close to 20 years. This means there are countless opportunities to recognize Christ within people in the midst of their very real needs.

Feed the hungry...bringing nourishing meals to a young mother of three (including a baby) while she faces a new diagnosis of Stage IV breast cancer.

Shelter the homeless...providing a place for a wife to feel safe and relax during her recently returned husband's battles with post-traumatic stress disorder and the demons of war.

Bury the dead...grieving with a dear friend and her young children after her husband and 11 other Marines were killed in an unthinkably tragic helicopter collision.

Truly, Christ is in our midst!

My family's year in paradise is nearly at an end, though it will be followed by a more sobering experience of military life as my husband deploys shortly thereafter for the remainder of 2016.

As our family returns to the mainland, my hope is that we may embrace the example of so many of our saints and seek the places we are needed. As Antiochian Women, may we notice, love, and serve Christ in all, including the military members and families in our midst.

Pray the Akathist to the Mother of God, Nurturer of Children

Raise my children, O Lady, to be made worthy of the Kingdom of Heaven and make them heirs of eternal blessings"- From the Akathist to the Mother of God, Nurturer of Children

What a great comfort the Mother of God is to us mothers if we avail ourselves to raise up our supplications to her and plead for her aid! Who better to intercede for our children than the Mother of all mothers? I truly believe the joy of her heart is to assist mothers in raising up their children in the way wherein they should go. She who gave birth to and lovingly raised our Lord from infancy to manhood is particularly able to relate to the concerns mothers have for their children.

These are perilous times for young people, for Satan is working overtime to ensnare our children in every variety of debauchery. There was a time in our nation when our Orthodox Christian values were encouraged and supported by society, wholesome values such as modesty, chastity, thrift, discretion, prudence, etc. Those days are long gone. The culture we live in now and the one in which we're raising our children has grown too toxic for parents to not be vigilant and quite intentional in cultivating Godly virtues in the children entrusted to their care. We parents need all the help we can get and it behooves us to seek help in our most blessed Theotokos.

As the mother of a former prodigal, I can tell you the Theotokos is a very real help in times of deep turmoil. I pray no mother would go through what I had gone through with my child. My story is one that has unfortunately been played out too frequently in these times of "live and let live". I have a child who got caught up in substance abuse and subsequently was expelled from not one but two high schools. A constant runaway, this child seemed hell-bent on self-destruction. There was many a night when my pillow was wet with tears from my despondency of not knowing where my child was or whether he was dead or alive. My dear friend, Jeanette Zarour, gave me a copy of the Akathist to the Mother of God, Nurturer of Children during this time. While praying it, it was not an uncommon occurrence that the pages of the precious booklet were moistened with the anguished tears of this heartbroken mother. I know the Theotokos heard my prayers because I received the peace that surpasses understanding in the midst of that tumultuous time. My husband and I received wisdom and direction in regards to our child and through the intercessions of the Theotokos; our son eventually came to himself and embraced the Orthodox faith. The sky's the limit now. He attends a junior college and is eager to attend as many church services as possible. This would have been inconceivable to us just one year ago. How great is our God and how dear is the Mother of our Lord for answered prayer! If you are having similar struggles with a child you love, I want to encourage you to get a hold of a copy of The Akathist to the Mother of God, Nurturer of Children and pray, pray! The words of this prayer will sustain you and give you hope. When we pray we are engaging in spiritual warfare as stated in Ephesians 6:12, "For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places."

With the assurance that our blessed Lady Theotokos does indeed hear our prayers and intercede on our behalf, we ladies of St. Anthony the Great parish, San Diego, CA have made a commitment to each other for our children's sake to gather together to pray *The Akathist to the Mother of God, Nurturer of Children* on a bi-weekly basis. Our gathering together to pray as sisters and mothers have been blessed and fruitful times for us. We know there is no greater good we can accomplish together than to raise up our voices in unity to ask the Theotokos for her intercession on behalf of the salvation of our children.

Perhaps God is calling the ladies of your parish to do the same.

Dear Friends of St. Barbara Monastery,

"Good repentance!" These words are the words monks and nuns are accustomed to using when greeting each other especially during this season of Great Lent. Like any greeting it can be over used so that its meaning fades for us, but in two words it captures the intent of Lent and the fundamental teaching of the Gospel.

How astonishing it is that with all of our preparations for Pascha, we can manage to forgo this essential one! We fast, we attend extra church services, we give alms, we clean house, we buy new clothes, maybe we stay up late preparing special food. What is even more astonishing is that we go to Holy Confession and still... nurse our besetting sins, harbor old grudges, ignore the needy. For each of us the list is a bit different. But for all of us, how helpful a reminder how to the point it is when we hear these words addressed to us: "Good repentance!"

Mysteriously—and truly it is a mystery—we find it difficult to genuinely utter the words "Forgive me" and to change our ways. This is undoubtedly the favorite trick of the Evil One: to put fear into our hearts at the very prospect of doing anything that brings unparalleled peace and joy! Fasting, giving unstintingly of our wealth or our time, acknowledging wrongdoing are all examples. When we overcome our inner obstacles—by the Power of the Cross—and do these things, the reward is the peace of God and His joy. And we realize that nothing, absolutely nothing, is worth more.

If we have reached this point in Lent and not yet truly begun this principal work of repentance, let us take heart from the words of Psalm 102: "The Lord is full of compassion and merciful, long suffering and of great goodness" (First Aniphon of the Divine Liturgy). Two weeks remain as well as Holy Week; the Lord is patiently giving us time to prepare ourselves.

"Good repentance!" With these words we greet each and every one of you. May none of us arrive at the great Paschal Liturgy unprepared.
