What is DIAKONIA


The word **DIAKONIA** is a Greek word meaning *Service*, usually pertaining to service in the Church. The purpose of the Antiochian Women's organization is primarily spirituality and humanitarian service. In the words of our beloved Metropolitan PHILIP it is *"Theology in Action"*.



Christ is risen! Truly, He is risen!

We consider the myrrh-bearers who witness to the Resurrected One as this newsletter goes out on this, the Sunday of the Myrrhbearers. What message do we receive from these holy women? What can we learn from their example and their experience? How can you Antiochian Orthodox Christian women benefit from their holy lives?

On Good Friday at 3 PM Jesus breathed His last breath upon the Cross and at about 6, His body was placed in the tomb. The women stood by "at a distance." Then the Sabbath transpired, the last solemn day of the Passover of the Jews. But this time that annual feast was about to be overshadowed and brought to a final culmination, never to be repeated. In Jerusalem, on that high Sabbath day, the crucifixion of Christ held the attention of all as the latest



news. On the next day, the first day of the week, the women went to the tomb for the third-day rituals. The rising of the sun found them already there. Their purpose was to anoint the body of the dead, so that it would not smell—the standard Jewish burial practice. The human sorrow of the women and their duty in behalf of the dead show that they could now keep in mind the promise of Jesus, that He would arise on the third day. They had believed also as did the disciples, that the Jesus-affair had come to an end. Nevertheless, they did not despair or "throw in the towel" as we say. Indeed, this is their greatest example to us. Despite their loss of heart and heavy sorrow, they got up and attended to their duties. Christian women never shirk their duty. What a surprise they will have in the doing of good works!

They arrived at the grave. At the last moment, they remembered the heavy rock, but oddly they noticed that the doorway of the grave was open. They automatically thought of desecration, not resurrection. They drew near to the tomb, to confirm the suspected crime of grave robbery. But, before they could even figure out the situation, they were confronted by another unexpected and welcome surprise. They saw a young man, who had just removed the heavy rock of the tomb so he could sit upon the right side. From the intensely white robe and the lightning-like face, they understood that they had a heavenly visitor before them.

The angel calmed their fear and quieted them, "do not be afraid," he says to them, "do ye seek the crucified Jesus? I gladly inform you that He has risen and He is not here. Look, the place in the tomb which had held His body is empty. Remember that He had told you that He would be delivered over into the hands of sinful men, that He would be crucified and on the third day that He would arise." Now the Lord's sayings came back to mind for the women. So then the angel continued: "Go now and tell His disciples and Peter, that He goes to Galilee ahead of them and there they will see Him as He had said to them before He was crucified." He mentioned Peter by name, because they were sure to have needed it, for Peter's sake. After that unfortunate denial, Peter was overwhelmed with the sense of rejection. But Christ knew his tears and already forgave him, and now the Lord does not separate him from the others. There is for Peter a two-fold joy—resurrection and forgiveness! And the women would bear the wondrous news. How we love to hear comforting words in a woman's tender voice! The Lord gave the agonized disciples such a comfort to open the Gospel to them through the sweet, tender voice of the women.

Who were they? According to the evangelists they were Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and John, and Salome. Luke adds others, such as Joanna. Each woman is instructive as to womanly virtues evident in them. Let us consider the three "apostles to the Apostles" mentioned by all the Gospels. There is

Mary Magdalene from whom seven demons were cast out (not to be confused with the adulterous woman, as some do)—she is the woman over which the demonic-inspired passions no longer hold sway. The Magdalene is a woman of God! She did not hesitate to carry the good news, because she did not care any longer about what others thought about her. She lived only for the Lord and loved Him with her whole heart. Nothing can dissuade her from sacred duty. Remember, she grasped the Lord's glorified feet! There is Salome, whose name means "peace." Salome is always quiet, looking out for the needs of the Lord, for she was the one "who followed after Him in Galilee and ministered unto Him" (Luke 15:41). Salome is an example of womanly liberality and leadership in supporting the upbuilding of the Church, for these supported the Lord. Let us not think that is only men's work! Where were the contributions from the wealthy men?

Then, most importantly, there is Mary "the mother of James and John," also called "the other Mary" by Matthew and Luke, is the mother of the resurrected One. She is none other than the God-bearer who shares with the Magdalene the burial anointing duty. The saints tell us that she is referred to in this humble way in the resurrection accounts, so as to avoid placing motherly attentiveness to the resurrected One in front place. This would distract us from the full focus on the risen Lord Himself. But consider this: How we must reflect upon the grief she felt, despite which she gathers courage and fortitude to go finish the burial rituals for her dear son. Mary the Mother of the Crucified did not hesitate to complete her loving care for the Body of her dear Son. But let the saint, St John of Damascus in his Paschal Canon, give us the God-inspired words of the angel proclaiming to her at the empty tomb, "The angel cried out unto her who is full of grace, "O pure one, Virgin, rejoice; and again I say, rejoice! Thy Son hath arisen from the tomb on the third day!" How her sorrow was turned to joy! The Theotokos as a myrrh-bearer shows us how womanly duty performed in love always meets with the divine surprise. What an antidote to worldly self-pity! We can follow her good example with great profit: when affairs in our personal lives, in our families, and in our communities become difficult and there are serious, seemingly unresolvable issues, you can be myrrh-bearing women and fulfill your Christian responsibility, knowing that the Lord never forsakes those who trust in Him.

It is not by chance that the first witnesses to the resurrection were women. This indicates their equality and indisputable and just honour which the resurrected One renders to the weaker sex in an era in which as all know women were ignored. The facts are simple! Women fulfill their unique role in the economy of salvation. Many great saints had saintly women who formed them and supported them, just as the myrrh-bearers had supported the Lord "out of their substance." Consider the saintly mother and sister of Basil the Great, Macrina the elder and Macrina the younger, also St Olympias the deaconess who stood by St John Chrysostom, supporting him out of her substance. We could continue in this vein, but it is enough to laud the myrrh-bearers as those women who live up to what womanhood is all about. They "rise while it is yet night" and "gird their loins with strength" and "open their mouths with wisdom" (Proverbs 31: 15, 17, 26) as they announce for the first time, "Jesus is risen as He foretold!"

Let us now follow their good example in our families, our churches, and our circle of influence, radiating the resurrection joy in all our good words and works.

Christ is risen!

Nothing is more elemental to life than water. Water sustains life; all the processes of our bodies are dependent on it. In fact, more than anything else, our bodies are composed of water. To thirst is to desire that which sustains us on the most basic level

On May 9 of this year, the Church celebrates the Feast of Mid-Pentecost, that Wednesday marking the mid-point between Pascha and Pentecost. On that day the Church continues to celebrate what has already come – the crucifixion and resurrection of

Jesus, the second person of the Holy Trinity – while looking forward to what is to come – the Holy Spirit, the third person of the Holy Trinity.

On this day we celebrate both the establishment and the experience of our salvation, our union with God. For it is the

Cross and Resurrection that establishes the means of that salvation and it is in the Church, established on the Day of Pentecost, where we experience that salvation.

At Mid-Pentecost we celebrate the enormity of God's love for us, the full revelation of the means established for our salvation. On the Cross, Christ conquers sin and death, the empty tomb proclaims the fruit of that victory and the Church is the kingdom established by the Holy Spirit and headed by Jesus Christ – the One who conquers.

At Divine Liturgy for the feast, the Gospel read is John 14:14-30. This gospel relates the account of Jesus speaking at the Mid-feast of the Feast of Tabernacles, an eight-day harvest festival during which the nation of Israel commemorated the wanderings of ancient Israel in the wilderness of Sinai. During the feast, one ceremony consisted of

carrying water from the pool of Siloam and pouring it as a libation in the temple. This ceremony commemorated the water that flowed from the rock that Moses struck in the wilderness. On this occasion, Christ proclaims, "If anyone thirst, let him come to Me and drink. He who believes in Me, as the Scripture has said, out of his heart will flow rivers of living water" (John 17:37-38),

The fathers of the Church have always seen this living water to be the Holy Spirit who was poured out on the Day of Pentecost, establishing the Holy Church. And so we stand at the feast of Mid-Pentecost gazing in awe and joy at this living

stream – its headwaters being the Cross ("out of His side flowed blood and water"); its course flowing through God's Church, sustaining and nourishing us in this life; and its culmination being Heaven itself. "And he showed me a pure river of water of life, clear as crystal, proceeding from the throne of God and of

the Lamb" (Rev.22:1). And again: "And the Spirit and the bride say 'Come' and let him who hears say 'Come'. And let him who thirst come. Whoever desires, let him take the water of life freely" (Rev.22:17).

How wondrous is God's love! How grand His purposes for those who love Him! He has immersed us in the streams of eternal life. The living water that flows from the cross through the Church to Heaven itself is given by God to sustain us and nourish us in the fullness of eternal life.

Even as it is the tradition of the Church to bless gardens with Holy Water at Mid-Pentecost asking God for the fruits of the earth, so too, here at Mid-Pentecost let us contemplate and celebrate the fruits nourished within us by streams of living water – the waters that flow from the cross through the Church to eternal life in heaven.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, God bless you!

The Rt Reverend Bishop ANTOUN - Diocesan Bishop



His Grace Bishop Antoun was consecrated to the Holv **Episcopacy** January 9, 1983 at the Cathedral of St. Nicholas in Brooklyn, where he served as pastor. His consecrating bishops included Metropolitan Philip (Saliba). He became diocesan bishop October 9, 2003 and currently bears the title Auxiliary Bishop Miami and the Southeast.

Bishop ANTOUN has served as a beloved pastor and educator in many settings, including St. Vladimir Orthodox Seminary in Crestwood, NY; St. George Church in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; St. George Church in Toronto, Ontario; St. George Church in Allentown, Pennsylvania; and St. Nicholas Cathedral in Brooklyn, New York.

Bishop ANTOUN was born Antoun Yssa Khouri on January 17, 1931 in Damascus, Syria. At the age of fourteen, he entered Minor Seminary at Balamand Monastery in Lebanon, where he met and befriended Philip Saliba, the future Metropolitan of North America. He received his diploma in theology from the Balamand Seminary.

On October 28, 1951, Antoun was ordained a deacon by Patriarch Alexander III at the Patriarchal Cathedral of the Dormition of the Theotokos in Damascus. Upon graduation from Assiyat Orthodox College in 1957, he was assigned to the Antiochian Orthodox Archdiocese of Brazil. In 1959 he came to the United States to pursue a Master of Divinity at St. Vladimir Orthodox Seminary, from which he graduated in 1962. He was ordained to the priesthood on May 29, 1960, by Metropolitan Antony Bashir, and was elevated to Archimandrite by Metropolitan Philip (Saliba) on August 3, 1969.

Bishop ANTOUN resides in Pompano Beach, Florida. His name day is January 17 (Anthony the Great).

Very Rev. Stephen Rogers - Spiritual Advisor



The Very Reverend Stephen Rogers is the senior priest at Saint Ignatius Antiochian Orthodox Church in Franklin, TN. He has served as the senior priest since 1996. Fr. Stephen was ordained by His Eminence Metropolitan PHILIP in February, 1987 and served as an assistant priest at St.

Ignatius until 1990. With the blessing of Metropolitan PHILIP, Fr. Stephen served as the assistant priest as Holy Cross-Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church in Birmingham, AL, in 1990-1992. He returned to Saint Ignatius as an assistant before being appointed senior priest in 1996. Fr. Stephen is married to Kh. Terry Rogers, a former president of the Antiochian Women in the Diocese of the South, and a former North American Board recording secretary. They have three adult daughters and six grandchildren. Fr. Stephen was appointed by His Grace Bishop ANTOUN to serve as spiritual advisor of Antiochian Women of the Diocese of Miami and the Southeast in 2008.

St. Helena's Ladies Guild of Holy Cross Orthodox Church Ormond Beach, Florida

Our Ladies Guild consists of a small group of women, usually 8 or 10, who meet on a monthly basis to plan events, projects, and celebrations, all part of our mission as Orthodox Christian women. The best part of "us" is what we do as a dedicated, hardworking, and committed "family." Everything we do, by the Grace of God, is in His Name. Following are a few examples of our efforts.

Our outreach projects include "feeding the hungry", and we accomplish this in partnership with another Christian church in our neighborhood. This "sister" church actually has a group of individuals who personally minister to the homeless by going out twice per week to areas where the homeless gather, bringing food, water, clothing, and other items. Our Guild's role in this act of kindness and charity is to help provide these essentials. This partnership came about through the efforts of one of our members who saw a need and took action.



Each year, our "Guild" hosts a Christmas Tea for all of our parish ladies. Each attendee is asked to purchase and donate a gift certificate from local stores (i.e. Walmart, CVS, Target, etc.). This past Christmas, those donated "gifts" were forwarded to the Domestic Violence and Abuse Council of Daytona, an agency providing safety and shelter to women and their children who had escaped violence.

Included in our works of charity is our continuous support of our parish's Prison Ministry. Recently, we were able to purchase Prayer Ropes to be distributed by our Father Michael to the many prisoners he has pastored and who have converted to Orthodoxy, or who are presently catechumens preparing for Chrismation. We also support our parish's St. Nicholas Charity Fund which provides discretionary funds for Father Michael to utilize in assisting parishioners and others in need.

One of our most joyous events came this past February as we joined with Father Michael in celebrating his Silver Anniversary as an Orthodox Priest. In gratitude and with great love, our Parish presented him with a Silver Cross in commemoration of this wonderful milestone. We, as a Parish, are greatly blessed by his presence and his guidance.
