On Wednesday, March 19, 2014, the Antiochian Orthodox Christian Archdiocese of North America, with great sadness, announced the passing unto life eternal of His Eminence the Most Reverend Metropolitan PHILIP, Archbishop of New York and Metropolitan of All North America. May his memory be eternal!

Metropolitan PHILIP led this Archdiocese as a loving father for 48 years during which it has seen unprecedented growth in number and spirituality. He established different organizations that would help grow and move the Archdiocese into the 21st century. He founded the Antiochian Women organization, a sisterhood serving Christ through serving others, the Order of St. Ignatius, the charitable arm of the Archdiocese and many more. Through his efforts, the Antiochian Village, near Pittsburgh, PA, was purchased. The Village now has a Camp for our children, Heritage and Learning Center for conferences, the beautiful St. Ignatius Chapel, the shrine of St. Thekla, the burial site of St. Raphael of Brooklyn next to which will be the burial site of Metropolitan PHILIP as well. All this on vast and breathtaking grounds in the heart of the country.

Fr. Constantine Nasr wrote: "His was a spirit of charity, justice, wisdom and council. His vision and his dream was to spread the Gospel, praying always for peace and goodwill among mankind. Although we mourn his passing, we must rejoice, for we now have an intercessor in heaven who knows and recognizes us by name as a Shepherd recognizes his sheep".

The Diocese of Miami and the Southeast

What is DIAKONIA

The word **DIAKONIA** is a Greek word meaning *Service*, usually pertaining to service in the Church. The purpose of the Antiochian Women's organization is primarily spirituality and humanitarian service. In the words of our beloved Metropolitan PHILIP it is *"Theology in Action"*.

Metropolitan PHILIP - Founder of the Antiochian Women Organization

"LAST, BUT NOT LEAST, we must realize once and for all that women have a definite ministry in the life of the Church. Very often we have the tendency to confine women's roles in the church just to the kitchen. Both the Old and the New Testaments testify beyond doubt to the important role which women played in the history of salvation. Time does not permit me to speak in detail about Ruth, Sarah, Rebecca, Rachael, the Virgin Mary, the ointment bearers, the deaconesses and many others who ministered to the Church and to Christ and were instruments of His Divine purpose in history. We don't have to consult the past too much in order to prove our point. If you just look around you in your own parish, you find those devout ladies serving God as church school teachers, choir members, youth leaders and fund raisers.

"It is very disappointing that in some parishes women are not allowed to vote or to be elected to Church Councils. We must definitely do away with this Medieval and archaic outlook concerning women. Our church does not teach that women are inferior to men. Despite their different functions, men and women are equal in the eyes of God because both were redeemed by His Precious Blood. St. Paul said, 'There is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus.' (Galatians 3:28)

"I propose, therefore, that a National Sisterhood of Charity be organized in the Archdiocese. The structure and goals of this organization will be defined in the future. I also propose that the President of this Sisterhood, by virtue of her office, should become a member of the Board of Trustees of the Archdiocese and should report annually to this General Assembly."

REFLECTIONS ON THE SERVICES FOR +METROPOLITAN PHILIP:


My husband, Richard, and I arrived at St. Nicholas We returned to St. Nicholas at 4:00 Cathedral at approximately 7:30 P.M. on Thursday P.M. on Friday afternoon for the evening. As we walked in to the Bengari area, there to Akathist Service. my immediate left was a beautiful portrait of Hierarchs from our Archdiocese and +Metropolitan PHILIP of thrice-blessed memory, those who came from around the country and the framed in white roses, white lilies and bay world were there and were seated on either side of leaves. Standing beside it was Fr. Michael Ellias, who Metropolitan PHILIP, facing him. The chanters, stood greeted us with "Christ is Risen!". To my immediate behind those seated on the right, lifted up their right, a member of St. Nicholas handed us a booklet beautiful voices and chanted with their heart and with +Metropolitan PHILIP's official portrait on the soul. At the completion of the Akathist Service, Fr. outside, and his life story on the inside. It included a Thomas Zain, pastor of St. Nicholas Cathedral and bookmark which also had the official portrait of Vicar General of the Archdiocese, informed all those +Metropolitan PHILIP, his date of birth, when he was in attendance, that if we were staying for the Funeral


ordained a deacon, a priest, Consecrated Metropolitan, and fell asleep in the Lord, on one side and "Thoughts of Metropolitan PHILIP" on the other.

As I looked down the aisle, I saw a candle stand with white roses, lilies, and surrounding greens it. holding large single positioned candle, at

Metropolitan PHILIP's head and one at his feet. As I looked beyond Metropolitan PHILIP's casket I saw the beautiful Iconostasis and Holy Doors framed with the same beautiful white flowers as well. The Great Compline was being chanted at this time so we sat in one of the pews. At the end of the service, Fr. Antony Gabriel eulogized +Metropolitan PHILIP. everyone seated was asked to come forward and approach the front of the church where +Metropolitan PHILIP lay. With a heavy heart and tear-filled eyes I approached the casket. +Metropolitan PHILIP was fully vested in his beautiful robes and crown, holding in his hands the Holy Bible, which I am sure he read from many times while serving at St. Nicholas Cathedral. After pausing, praying and kissing the Holy Bible, I moved passed only to look up and see Archbishop JOSEPH and Bishop JOHN. We greeted each other with "Christ is Risen!". How comforting it was to see them both, especially at a time like this, and their connection to mv dear Sisters Trisagion Prayers were chanted at various times throughout Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

everything from Miudara to Zaatar to Pumpkin Kibba. etc. God bless them they did a wonderful job. We all returned to the church for the Funeral Service. The Hierarchs and the chanters lifted up their voices, and chanted in unison, as if in one voice, in Arabic and English. At the end of the service, a Legislator from the state of New Jersey, read a series of Proclamations from the New Jersey Assembly, and presented Metropolitan SILOUAN a framed copy of the document. Then Bishop ANTOUN stood up and spoke to all of us and to his dear friend and brother in Christ, +Metropolitan PHILIP. He began with a few short stories on how they first met at seminary, how +Metropolitan PHILIP, who loved to tease, teased him incessantly, and how a beautiful friendship was formed. He spoke of +Metropolitan PHILIP's dreams and accomplishments, especially his love of children and wanting to build them a camp, which became Antiochian Village, how women were the backbone of the church and the founding of the Antiochian Women, and then the Order of St. Ignatius, which everyone doubted would be a successful organization,



except for +Metropolitan PHILIP. In the end, he turned toward +Metropolitan PHILIP, and cried out, "Good-bye my friend, good-bye!" There wasn't a dry eye in the entire church. It was extremely emotional, as we all know how close they were to each other.

Divine Liturgy began at 9:00 A.M. on Saturday morning, followed by the Funeral Service, led by His Eminence Metropolitan SILOUAN. The reverence shown by all who attended, including Metropolitans and Bishops from Mexico, Chili, Brazil, France, Tripoli and Syria, to name a few, who had participated in all of the services, as well as a Moslem Cleric and Dignitaries, were a tribute to Metropolitan PHILIP's legacy. The Funeral Service and all of the beautiful chanting was in Arabic and English. At the end of the service, each spoke and shared their thoughts of +Metropolitan PHILIP as a leader, a firm believer in unity of all of the Orthodox Churches throughout the world, his compassion for all mankind, his love of children and wanting them to have a camp to go to each summer, which led to the Antiochian Village, and in time seven more camps throughout our Archdiocese, the role of women in the church who he believed to be the backbone of the church, with the formation of the Antiochian Women, and the love and concern for his clergy. A message of condolence by His Eminence Patriarch JOHN X. who was unable to be with us, was read.

On Sunday morning, a beautiful Patriarchal Divine Liturgy, led by Metropolitan SILOUAN, was followed by Trisagion Prayers.

In closing, I would like to leave you with one of the "Thoughts of Metropolitan PHILIP":







On Holy Friday, He is crucified. On Holy Saturday, He descends into Hell and preaches the good news of hope and salvation to those held in captivity. On Sunday, He rises from the grave. On Ascension, he takes our humanity into Heaven.

Personal Reflection

Lord, Jesus Christ, grant me Your Peace, Comfort and Your Strength.

In October of 2009, this became my prayer. My husband, the Archpriest Michael, was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. After the initial shock...so many questions. What were the treatment options, if any? Chemo? Radiation? Surgery? How much time did he have? How were we going to tell our families? How were we going to tell our St. Luke's family? How were we going to handle this "death sentence"? We hoped for the best; prepared for the worst. But we prayed, "Thy will be done"... I pray it daily when I recite the Lord's Prayer; but when crisis strikes, do I really mean that? Do I want God's will to be done? As an Orthodox Christian, *I believe anything that comes our way* is somehow for our salvation...so yes, "Thy will be done".

Lord, Jesus Christ, grant me Your Peace, Comfort and Your Strength.

After a month of chemo and radiation, surgery was on Bright Wednesday, 2010. It couldn't come at a more perfect time, three days after celebrating the glo-



rious Resurrection of Our Lord! Surely God would hear the prayer of one of His priests and allow him to continue ministering to his flock. After many hours into surgery, the surgeon called us into a private room and told us the devastating news. Needless to say, that it took all my energy to listen to what the surgeon was telling us, while dealing with the shock, the disbelief that my husband was not going to be alright, but rather the total opposite. Lord, how was I going to tell the large group of parishioners that

have gathered in the waiting room? How was I going to be of comfort to them? How was I going to be of comfort to our daughters? How was I going to tell my husband, when he's out of surgery and in recovery?

Lord, Jesus Christ, grant me Your Peace, Comfort and Your Strength.

After allowing my husband sufficient time to recover surgery, he began a 6-month round of chemo ... 3 weeks on/ 1 week off...trying to slow the growth of the cancer. So began a new phase in our lives; surely, this was not the life I signed up for when we were married. Or was it? "O Lord, Thou hast ordained for them an indissoluble bond of love". We tried to keep things at home "as normal as possible": enjoying Angel baseball games, going to a few concerts, skeet and trap shooting at the range, etc. As his health permitted, my husband continued to serve at the Holy Altar and go to the church office.

God is good! My husband was feeling as well as can be, with no major side effects from the chemo. So with the ok from his doctor, in August, 2010, we booked a cruise to Alaska. We had planned on a land trip to Alaska in 2011 to celebrate our 25th Wedding Anniversary, but we were not dumb about pancreatic cancer and we knew that the chances of us being together for our 25th were extremely slim. By God's grace, we were able to venerate the icon of "Our Lady of Sitka". In February, 2011, 6 months before our actual 25th anniversary, we spent 4 days at a bed and breakfast in Julian, CA, to celebrate. I noticed that he's rapidly losing weight and tiring more than usual. He said he just doesn't feel quite right inside.

A CT scan in March, 2011, confirmed what we already suspected. The cancer was spreading, as the doctor said, with a vengeance. Forgive me. Selfishly, I thought only of myself. I was going to be a widow. How was I going to handle that? Who's going to be there for me? Who's going to walk our daughters down the aisle at their weddings? Who's going to baptize our grandchildren? With whom was I going to grow old?

When I attended the church services, my eyes were immediately drawn to the iconostasis, where our church has an icon of St. Sophia and her 3 daughters, Faith, Hope and Love. How could I possibly complain about what I was going through, as I was watching this horrific disease consume my husband, while this poor mother witnessed her daughters' martyrdom?

We went to the local funeral home to make arrangements. Surprisingly, or not, we were "comfortable" with everything and it wasn't as "creepy" as we thought is

would be. We even went to Starbucks when we finished. Afterwards, there was a deep sense of calm, peace, and I dare say, a type of holiness in our home and with all of us. We prayed together every evening and my husband anointed us with oil from the shines of many saints. Some may say that he was preparing to die, while I believe he was preparing to live...in the Kingdom!

Lord, Jesus Christ, grant me Your Peace, Comfort and Your Strength.

Mid-July, we set up hospice care in our home. We knew that time is drawing near. But when? My husband said he's ready; he was getting antsy. I spent my days and nights by his side. We talked; we prayed; yes, we even laughed.

August 12th, we noticed a huge decline; he could no longer get out of his chair, he was drinking very little, he could not swallow his meds. On Sunday, the 14th, Fr. Jon came to bring him, what would be, his final Holy Communion in this world. As Fr. Jon is reading the prayers, my husband's lips were moving, he was reciting the prayers. After he received the Holy Gifts, he smiled, looked upward and said "thank you".

Lord, Jesus Christ, grant me Your Peace, Comfort and Your Strength.

August 15th, the Feast of the Dormition of the Most-Holy Theotokos. My husband's breathing was shallow but not labored. He was not responsive to earthly voices. His face was very peaceful. My daughters, along with a dear friend, and I read the Canon for the Departing of the Soul from the Body. When we finished the canon, he breathed his last. We sang the Trisagion for the Departed and made the appropriate phone calls.

Lord, Jesus Christ, grant me Your Peace, Comfort and Your Strength.

On August 17th, on what was supposed to be our 25th Wedding Anniversary, we prayed the Panikhida. We sang "Memory Eternal" instead of "God grant you many years". ... it just didn't seem fair.

Lord, Jesus Christ, grant me Your Peace, Comfort and Your Strength.

I prayed this throughout the funeral service. It was the only way I could keep it together. And it continues to be my prayer, moment by moment, day by day.

The Rt Reverend Bishop ANTOUN - Diocesan Bishop



His Grace Bishop Antoun was consecrated to the Holy Episcopacy on January 9, 1983 at the Cathedral of St. Nicholas in Brooklyn, where he served as pastor. His consecrating bishops included Metropolitan Philip (Saliba). He became a diocesan bishop on October 9, 2003 and currently bears the title Auxiliary Bishop of Miami and the Southeast.

Bishop ANTOUN has served as a beloved pastor and educator in many settings, including St. Vladimir Orthodox Seminary in Crestwood, NY; St. George Church in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; St. George Church in Toronto, Ontario; St. George Church in Allentown, Pennsylvania; and St. Nicholas Cathedral in Brooklyn, New York.

Bishop ANTOUN was born Antoun Yssa Khouri on January 17, 1931 in Damascus, Syria. At the age of fourteen, he entered Minor Seminary at Balamand Monastery in Lebanon, where he met and befriended Philip Saliba, the future Metropolitan of North America. He received his diploma in theology from the Balamand Seminary.

On October 28, 1951, Antoun was ordained a deacon by Patriarch Alexander III at the Patriarchal Cathedral of the Dormition of the Theotokos in Damascus. Upon graduation from Assiyat Orthodox College in 1957, he was assigned to the Antiochian Orthodox Archdiocese of Brazil. In 1959 he came to the United States to pursue a Master of Divinity at St. Vladimir Orthodox Seminary, from which he graduated in 1962. He was ordained to the priesthood on May 29, 1960, by Metropolitan Antony Bashir, and was elevated to Archimandrite by Metropolitan Philip (Saliba) on August 3, 1969.

Bishop ANTOUN resides in Pompano Beach, Florida. His name day is January 17 (Anthony the Great).

Very Rev. Stephen Rogers - Spiritual Advisor



The Very Reverend Stephen Rogers is the senior priest at Saint Ignatius Antiochian Orthodox Church in Franklin, TN. He has served as the senior priest since 1996. Fr. Stephen was ordained by His Eminence Metropolitan PHILIP in February, 1987 and served as an assistant priest at St. Ignatius until 1990. With the

blessing of Metropolitan PHILIP, Fr. Stephen served as the assistant priest as Holy Cross-Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church in Birmingham, AL, in 1990-1992. He returned to Saint Ignatius as an assistant before being appointed senior priest in 1996. Fr. Stephen is married to Kh. Terry Rogers, a former president of the Antiochian Women in the Diocese of the South, and a former North American Board recording secretary. They have three adult daughters and six grandchildren. Fr. Stephen was appointed by His Grace Bishop ANTOUN to serve as spiritual advisor of Antiochian Women of the Diocese of Miami and the Southeast in 2008.



As parishioners of <u>St. Nicholas Orthodox Church in Springdale</u>, <u>Arkansas</u> entered church on Sunday March 9th for the Sunday of Orthodoxy Divine Liturgy, they were greeted at the door by Kate Salem, Jessica Browne, and Talitha Lourie who took turns passing out the "I am an Antiochian Woman" stickers. After the singing of Holy God, Susan Campbell (pictured), chanted the Epistle. During the Megalynarion Hymn to the Theotokos, Hannah Scherer and Isabella Kavouris were blessed to collect the offering. At the end of the service, Hannah Mindeman (pictured) received the blessing to read the Sermonette. Throughout Antiochian Woman's month Ladies of St. Nicholas (accompanied often by younger girls) were scheduled to participate in ushering, taking the collections, holding the antidoron, and chanting the Epistle.

This year has been an important year in parish growth and vision for St. Nicholas. The University parish (serving the University of Arkansas Orthodox Christian Fellowship), only this past year, had its status upgraded from "Mission" to "Middle-Sized Parish" following the ordination of three subdeacons by Bishop Antoun in February 2013, all of which has slowly begun to amend the identity of the St. Nicholas community. Konstantine Lautillo at Antiochian Village, The Ladies of St. Nicholas with joy embraced the project of *diakonia* and love of supporting our sister Antiochian Mission Church, St. Theophan the Recluse in Manila, Philippines (see picture) by selling their beautifully hand-crafted prayer ropes and using full-color photos of Fr. Konstantine and Kh. Marina Lautillo and their parishioners (many of whom are children) to convey the significance. Although only a fraction of our community can claim Middle Eastern ancestry, we have all identified with the plight of the Syrian orphans of war and have been moved by the 2014 Project initiated by our Father and Metropolitan Philip, of eternal memory; to that end we have distributed collection jars and will be having a Palm Sunday Fish Soup & Salad Fundraiser. While we now mourn the passing of our beloved Metropolitan Philip, it is our prayer that our ministry in the service of Christ according to the principles of *Antiochian Women* founded by our Father, Metropolitan Philip, will continue the fruit of his labors to God's glory. 
