Message from Lisa Phillips, President of Antiochian Women of the Diocese of Miami and the Southeast

Thank God for another year to serve and be faithful to His calling! I am reminded of the verse "Commit your works to the Lord and your plans will be established" (Proverbs 16:3). As we have given our works to Him, He has truly revealed His plan.

The goal of the Antiochian Women is to continually anoint the Body of Christ. In the Diocese of Miami and the Southeast, we seek to fulfill obligations such as annual dues (for the efficient operation of the Diocese organization), annual offering for the Project (this year collecting for the Convent of St. Thekla) and donations for the Benevolence fund (for local outreach and ministry that God puts before us).

The officers of our Diocese communicate on a regular basis with the presidents of the local chapters and a few priests in some cases. We email, write letters and make phone calls to keep in touch. One of the main goals for me has been to educate our ladies on the workings of the Antiochian Women. We have worked hard to simplify the obligations we are committed to and we work hard to follow through. Khouria Dannie Moore simplified it best during her term with a summary of our responsibilities:

Five Major Events to Remember

First remember ---

- *Meet together often
- *Together, pray, read the Scripture, read the lives of the Saints, read a book, prepare your cards to "our friends" and plan your acts of mercy.
- *Then, take care of your business.
 - I. <u>Dues</u> -- Money that helps our local Diocese and our Archdiocese. \$75.00 of the dues from every parish is sent on to the Archdiocese and the rest remains in our Diocese for our expenses and ministry. We request that this be sent in October to the Treasurer.
- II. <u>Delegates Meeting</u> a meeting in mid-winter with AW officers and delegates from each AW chapter to plan for the Conference.
- III. <u>Project</u> Convent of St. Thekla (Mother Abbess Alexandra) at Antiochian Village; project money sent by April 15th to the Treasurer
 - IV. <u>Parish Life Conference</u> All our churches come together with His Grace, Bishop ANTOUN, presiding for the purpose of

presiding for the purpose of planning, fellowship and fun.

V. <u>Fundraiser or Donation at Parish Life Conference</u> - proceeds for Children's Relief Fund and our Benevolence Fund: (scholarships for Camp St. Thekla; annual donation to Mother Nektaria; financial needs/emergencies that may arise; and financial help for Diocesan-elected officers to attend Parish Life Conference and Mid-winter meeting - at the discretion of the executive committee members).

While all of this is important and essential to the proper functioning of our organization, we must keep in mind what is of greater importance. Our souls must be fed and nourished regularly that we may truly be servants of God.

Thus, we encourage our local chapters to meet first for prayer, reading God's word and fellowship. As the spiritual needs are met, we will find the strength and ability to fulfill our obligations.

We are especially blessed to have Mother Nektaria living in our Diocese. She lives at St. Paul Skete in Grand Junction, TN outside Memphis.

We were blessed to hear from her at the Parish Life Conference in 2009. Several of our local chapters invite her to visit for retreats from time to time.

North American Board, Diocesan Officers and Delegates meet in July

At the NAB summer meeting held July 23-24 Antiochian Women were happy to present a check for \$113,031.97 to His Eminence Metropolitan PHILIP for this year's NAB project, the building of the Convent of St. Thekla at Antiochian Village.

NAB President Cindy Nimey and Vice-President/NAB Project Violet Robbat also gave him a check for \$6,802.56 for the 2009 project, Al Kafaat of Lebanon. This amount, sent to NAB since last July's meeting, was earmarked specifically for this project.

The NAB meets two times a year with diocesan officers, coordinators and delegates.

It was a wonderful time for the women to get together; they also had the opportunity to meet with Mother Abbess Alexandra of St. Thekla and to tour the serene site of the new monastery at Antiochian Village.

Other business included:

- 1. Distribution of the Antiochian Women Membership Handbook which NAB Membership Coordinator Kh. Suzanne Murphy updated and reformatted. The excellent new 68-page handbook covers the focus and purpose of the organization and includes articles such as "Recruitment & Retention of Members" and the constitution and by-laws.
- 2. Announcement of the NAB scholarship winners. They are Melanie Keel Wilkes, Martha Stewart, Lamees Mukiar and Mary Curry.
- 3. Discussion of/participation in the making of the Antiochian Women's video. It will be showcased at the archdiocesan convention in Chicago, IL, in July 2011.
- 4. Clarification of deadlines and procedures for sending donations to past years' projects. This information will be sent to the diocesan officers.
- 5. Correction to the reimbursement policy. The revised version will be sent to NAB and diocesan officers/coordinators.
- 6. Announcement of the mid-winter meeting, Feb. 4-6, 2011, at Antiochian Village.

Following are highlights from diocesan reports; the amount given to this year's NAB project is in parentheses at end of paragraphs.

Diocese of Charleston, Oakland the Mid-Atlantic and the Diocese of New York and Washington D.C.: The women sponsor a retreat at Antiochian Village during the fifth weekend in Lent. The icon in memory of Kh. Joanne Abdalah is displayed at Antiochian Village. (\$17,457.95)

Diocese of Los Angeles and the West: The women gave \$200 to diocesan seminarians at Christmas, offered six full retreat scholarships and donated to IOCC and Focus America. (\$12,390.80)

Diocese of Miami and the Southeast: The women are encouraged to simplify business and focus on the spiritual at their meetings. The officers communicate with the chapters on a regular basis. See article on pages 4-5. (\$29,402.70)

Diocese of Ottawa, Eastern Canada and Upstate NY: They awarded a scholarship to a deserving woman and a camp scholarship; at the PLC a child psychiatrist spoke. The religious coordinator led an interactive marriage workshop. (\$11,390.00)

Diocese of Toledo and the Midwest: The Metropolitan PHILIP Award was presented to Daisy Isaac of Flint, MI. Mother Alexandra was guest speaker at their annual retreat (weekend after Mother's Day at Dormition Monastery in Rives Junction, MI). The diocesan project was sale of Ukrainian Easter Egg Decorating Kits. (\$15,100.00)

Diocese of Wichita and Mid-America: Their retreat is Oct. 22-24 in Oklahoma City. Because there are over 50 churches, some with as few of 25 members, they found it necessary to tier their dues structure. They donated \$1226.00 to Camp St. Raphael from sales of assorted items. (\$14,876.09)

Diocese of Worcester and New England: They sponsored a Lenten retreat with Mother Alexandra. They donated to the Teen SOYO Special Olympics; the icon in memory of Kh. Joanne Abdalah; Haiti and Chili relief funds; Bishop ANTOUN's anniversary celebration; the Children's Relief Fund. The 11 parishes will honor spiritual advisor Fr. Edward Hughes at a Sept. 19 reception. (\$12,211.00)





DID SOMEONE SEND A CARD?

HE LAST DAYS OF SUMMER in the year 1975 had come to the beautiful rolling hills of East Tennessee. The flowers in the gardens no longer had the brilliant colors of early and mid-summer. Many plants had ceased to flourish and some were struggling to keep a few blossoms alive. In either case, as one looked around the plants sent a message — "We will stay as long as we can."

It was in this setting that a neighbor and I walked one day. It was the end of summer, late in the day and with enough beauty left in her garden for one to know, "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof" (Psalm 24:1).

While talking about her garden she grasped my hand and looked me straight in the eye. Then from her heart came the words, "You know, it takes 'guts' to grow old." I offered a few words and we lingered a while longer. We said goodnight and promised we would see each other the next day.

Spring and summer had come and gone in my friend's life. She was now in the time of autumn and winter was coming. After twenty-five years, it is easy to remember her standing amidst the flowers and with all her strength saying, "It takes 'guts' to grow old."

Now, travel with me down the road of life. It is January, 1998. Father Andrew and I are attending a Delegates' meeting in St. Petersburg, Florida for the Southeast Region. The AOCWNA (Antiochian Orthodox Christian Women of North America) meeting has ended, so I join my husband at the Fellowship of St. John the Divine meeting. As I quietly find a vacant seat, the words float through the air, "Father (a



retired priest) has written a note and would like for us to correspond with him occasionally." Upon hearing the words, the thought came, "How many in our region need to hear from someone? How many are in their last days and are like my friend from East Tennessee?"

Over the next few days guidance was given by the Holy Spirit. Within a few weeks, names were gathered by the local Antiochian Women Presidents and Humanitarian Coordinators. After the names and addresses were sent to me, a list was compiled and mailed with a letter of how we could implement a ministry of words and love. We now had a way to keep in touch with those who, for various reasons, must stay home or be in a place where others care for them. Each local ladies' group was asked to divide the names among themselves and every month send a card with a few encouraging words. With the power of words on a

eard there would also be the power of prayer.

Now, it is the year 2000, and for two years many of the Antioehian Women chapters in our Southeast Region have been faithful and diligent in reaching out and blessing the lives of our friends. At present, we have thirty-four parishioners with whom we correspond monthly. And as we give a blessing, God, through these precious friends, sends a blessing back to us.

Here are a few examples of these blessings:

One woman, upon receiving her first card, sleeps that evening with it under her pillow.

A parishioner who visits one of our friends in a nursing home calls and relates how much the eards have meant to her as she reads them while she visits.

One of our friends, once an avid gardener, now looks at her garden from the window, and writes, "Your earing for me gives me great joy."

The sister of one of our friends writes to thank us and ask that we light a candle often for her sister.

The khouriye of a dear priest departed this life writes to us often and gives us back a hundredfold of love and blessings.

The words spoken by Jameely Saad will forever ring in our ears, "Angela, did someone send a card?"

From a mother and daughter, "Your prayers and the love of God you send do us so much good."

From the mother of young Alex, now ten years old and near death, "I know people care because we receive so many eards."

Glory be to God!

In the last two years, eight of our precious friends have fallen asleep in the Lord. Memory Eternal! We hope

that a day or two before, a card came giving them love and encouragement.

There are those on our list who are not elderly but are at a time in their lives when it is better to remain at home. Having been faithful in their parishes, it is now time for us to meet them where they are.

Christ met people where they were and touched their lives. The simple, ordinary things on this earth were used, and with and by the power of God, lives were transformed and healing came. We are now servants of God on this earth to reach out and touch people. Small, simple things, with God's power, can be used to penetrate the soul of a person. By the Holy Spirit, the words we write, the love we convey, the care we give will bring peace. To know someone loves you enough to keep in touch with you will bring healing in some way.

God so loved us that He gave His only begotten Son, and He has made it possible through Holy Scripture that we can read of that great love every day. Our hearts should swell with gratitude at this mighty act. Our hearts should tremble within us until we share words of love, comfort, courage, peace, and joy with those in need. So many are waiting just to hear or read simple words ... "I thought of you today," "I am praying for you," "God loves you and so do I."

With the haunting words of my friend in East Tennessee, "It takes 'guts' to grow old," I also hear our friend Jameely Saad ask, "Angela, did someone send a card today?"

God help us to show His loving kindness and to give our friends words that will impart strength and courage.

Thank you to those who take the time to share in this ministry of written words. "May the Lord of peace Himself give you peace always in every way. The Lord be with you all" (2 Thessalonians 3:16).

As you can see the article, "Did Someone Send a Card?" was written by Kh. Dannie Moore and was published in the WORD magazine in January 2001. We thank God for leading Kh. Dannie to begin this ministry that has continued and grown in our Diocese since then. There has always been about 40 names on the list, but many of the dear friends have departed this life from time to time. We want to keep their memory eternal by keeping this ministry alive.

In our parish, St. Stephen in Hiram, GA, we regularly hear from some of those on our friends' list. Many of them are not able to attend services and functions of the church but they are able to communicate. We want them to know they are not forgotten and more importantly that they are loved. We consider it a privilege to show our love for those who have loved the church, have lived their lives in the church and now for various reasons cannot be physically in the church as often.

Occasionally we even hear from family members who are grateful for the words of encouragement we send. Most of them contact us when one of these friends departs this life.

Our humanitarian coordinator keeps our friends' list current and contacts the parishes and missions regularly for changes, updates and additions. It is suggested that each ladies' chapter appoint a woman in their parish to coordinate this ministry. Chapters can send cards every 4-6 weeks, and especially for Christmas, Lent and Pascha. At St. Stephen we have our church school classes make cards and send them at least twice a year. Sometimes we send group cards, signed by several of us, and other times we divide the cards and write personal notes from one person. It will depend on your parish and those who want to be involved in this ministry.

Be creative and think of those beautiful people who will be receiving the uplifting cards and words. Anoint these people as you would the Body of Christ.
